City Woman's Plight: Her Children Are Up for Adoption; She Wants but Can't Have Them

Suppose you were the mother of three tiny children whose husband ran off with another woman and took the children with him, leaving you penniless and pregnant.

Suppose you knew where your husband went but were not able to reach the children because your husband and the other woman took care of them adequately in another state a long way away.

Suppose after your other child was born you were able to scrape along on a pension until you deserted mothers by the state, you learned your husband had deserted your children out in Nebraska.

Then suppose after getting into a long, complicated legal tangle trying to have your children returned to you, you found out that they were to be adopted by others and there was nothing you could do because you didn't have enough money.

Well, it may sound like a typical hard-luck story in over-imaginative fiction, but it has happened to a young Madison woman, Mrs. Clarence Colvin.

And that isn't the half of it. Betty Colvin, who now lives in a little house at 219 Madison ave. with her mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Heath, got a letter a little while ago. It was from Betty and her mother, and it began:

"It is remarkable, indeed, the difficulty we have had in locating these children."

"The picture you give us of you few ladies and officials at Madison, Wis., is so interesting and so sustaining even yourselves; that you have been and are, sustained by the lawyers that you have not security whatever to offer these children. Wherefore (sic) it is the order of their court to order these children returned (sic) to any mother who can be located."

"This is the only picture Mrs. Colvin has of her three children. It was taken by her husband in July, 1931, just after he left her taking the children.

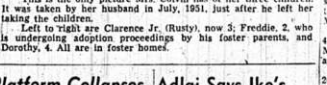
